On May 18 Jean Reichenbach and I attended the Opus 85 Open House at Taylor and Boody Organ Builders in Staunton, VA. Opus 85 is our organ. By the way, the white components at the top of the pipe towers are wood carvings which will ultimately be stained to match the organ.

June 3rd Is A Big Day

Taylor and Boody will disassemble the organ and deliver it to us on June 3rd. We will need help to unload the components on June 3rd and carry them into the Nave. At the end of delivery day at 5 PM, we will have a celebration where we can meet the Taylor and Boody personnel who will be here for several weeks and celebrate this important milestone. We believe that around 1:30 would be a good time for volunteers to arrive but will firm that up between now and then.

We are nearing the end of more than four years of fundraising, enhancing the Nave and waiting for the organ. We are almost there. Thank you for your generosity and your patience.



This past Tuesday, the Women's Book Study began reading *Mudbouse* Sabbath: An Invitation to a Life of Spiritual Discipline by Lauren Winner.

Winner writes and lectures widely on Christian practice, the history of Christian America, and Jewish-Christian relations. After her conversion from Orthodox Judaism to Christianity, Lauren Winner found that her life was indelibly marked by the rich traditions and spiritual practices of Judaism.



Whether discussing attentive eating, marking the days while grieving, the community that supports a marriage, candle-lighting, or the differences between the Jewish Sabbath and a Sunday spent at the Mudhouse, her favorite coffee shop, Winner writes with honesty and insight.


Contemplative Prayer - Mystical Hope: Trusting in the Mercy of God

Study Book: *Mystical Hope: Trusting in the Mercy of God* by Cynthia Bourgeault

When we encounter struggles and challenges in our daily life, we yearn for the good news of hope to pull us through our difficulties. As we journey through the wellsprings of hope, we're invited to grow in our understanding of how we perceive this gift in our lives. Do we see hope through the lens of desired results, or do we see it through the lens of trust? Author Cynthia Bourgeault says, "In our usual way of looking at things, hope is tied to outcome: 'I hope I get this job' or 'I

hope my mother gets well.' The Bible introduces us to a different kind of hope that has its source not in events but in the mercy of God, a lifeblood of compassion connecting our heart to God's heart and the heart of all creation." You are invited to come and participate in the weekly Contemplative Prayer group, which explores and studies the book, *Mystical Hope: Trusting in the Mercy of God*. During each session, we will support one another in our pilgrimage of prayer and our search for a deeper understanding of God's gift of hope. Let us trust that in the search itself, as we open ourselves to God's transforming love.

Changes to our Communion Pattern: A Message from the Clergy

In past few week's newsletters, we invited you to watch this <u>video</u> from Paul & Suzanne about how and why our communion patterns will be changing this summer.

As a quick recap, beginning June 2, we will no longer offer wine or grape juice from individual cups. The common cup is the normative practice for the Episcopal Church, reflecting our theology of the Eucharist.

Our new pattern will look like this:

- At the main altar rail, we will offer regular communion bread and the common cup. You may sip from the cup. If you wish to intinct (dip the wafer in the wine), we ask that you hold it so the Eucharistic Minister can take it from you, dip it in the wine, and hand it back to you.
- At the lower communion station, we will offer regular communion bread as well as gluten-free bread. We will have one common cup to sip from. We will also have a different chalice just for intinction. Just as we are doing at the main altar rail, the Eucharistic Minister will dip the bread and hand it back to you.
- We will also have grape juice in a common cup from which one may also intinct in the same manner.

We do not make this change lightly but with great thought, prayer, and in lengthy conversation with the Vestry and Eucharistic Ministers. If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to either the <u>Rector</u> or <u>Associate Rector</u>.



SUMMER POP-UP CHOIR: What is a pop-up choir at Christ Church? Our summer pop-up choir is open to anyone who enjoys singing and would like the opportunity to be a part of an easy and fun choral group in church on Sunday mornings! You do not need to have any prior singing or music experience to join this group and there is no commitment to attend every pop-up Sunday. Pop-up choir will rehearse on select Sundays at 9:15 am in the nave; we'll learn and practice a few songs and hymns, pick the ones we like best, and then sing them in church during communion at the 10:00 am service. Pop-up choir dates are: 6/9, 6/23, 7/7, 7/21, 8/18. (5 total)

MUSIC TALK SERIES: Explore new topics, philosophies and ideas about music. This summer, our Director of Music will present a series of short talks on select Sunday mornings from 9:15-9:45 am in the Parish House or the Chapel. The talks are approximately 20 minutes, followed by 10 minutes of Q&A. Each presentation integrates new research and ideas that are currently shaping the way we think about music into different topics such as: time perception and music, concepts of musical ownership, sacred expression through music, meaning in music and hymnody; as well as historical topics such as: the history of public performance, the Bach Passions, and a history of the pipe organ. The first talk is Sunday, June 2nd, the day before the organ builders arrive, and is titled, The Pipe Organ: how it's built and why it matters.
